Colossians 1:24-2:5
"All Will Be Well"

### **SUMMARY**

After the opening greeting and thanksgiving (1:1-14), the body of Paul's letter to the Colossians bursts open with an uplifting statement on the supremacy of Christ (1:15-23). The statement is so marvelous, you wonder where Paul could possibly go from there. Wouldn't anything after that be a letdown? No. Paul next turns to a question which was likely burning in the imaginations of the Colossian Christians. After being locked up in prison, how are you doing, Paul? Are you OK?

At this point, Paul had been a prisoner for several years and had been moved halfway across the Empire to stand trial in Rome. He was facing extended adversity. How was he holding up? Was he discouraged? Fearful? Hopeful?

Paul answers the unspoken question of the Colossians through the lens of the supremacy of Christ. It was the same lens through which Paul, since his conversion of the road to Damascus, viewed all of life. Because of Jesus, he was well. Note the strong verbs the Apostle uses to describe his state of mind:

- · "I rejoice in what I am suffering for you" 1:24.
- · Christ "is the one we proclaim, admonishing and teaching everyone with all wisdom" 1:28.
- · "I strenuously contend with all the energy Christ so powerfully works in me" 1:29.
- $\cdot$  "I want you to know how hard I am contending for you and for those at Laodicea" 2:1.

Paul thought his suffering in prison was purposeful and part of God's plan. He still had opportunities to encourage friends near and far through writing letters, like this one to the Colossians. Paul hoped the Colossians would find their identity in Christ (1:24-27), would grow to maturity in Christ (1:28-29), and have the familiarity of knowing Christ in a personal way (2:1-5). Also note the way Paul weaves into this section mention of the three theological virtues of faith (2:5), hope (1:27), and love (2:2).

## The City of Colossae

Colossae lay about one hundred miles due east of Ephesus in the interior of Asia Minor (the western part of modern Türkiye). Five centuries before the New Testament, it was the largest city in the Lycus River Valley. By the first century AD, it had been overtaken by nearby Laodicea and Hierapolis in both size and importance. Paul neither founded the church in Colossae nor visited it. Instead, he had apparently converted its pastor, Epaphras (1:7-8; 4:12-13), during the two years the Apostle lived and preached in Ephesus. We are told that during that time "all the Jews and Greeks who lived in the province of Asia heard the word of the Lord." (Acts 19:10)

The highest peak of Asia Minor's Aegean region, Mount Cadmus (8,200 feet in elevation), overlooks Colossae a short distance to the south. The 500-acre ancient site of Colossae has never been excavated.
